

1. (C) Operations: Significant Activities.

A. Command Group:

(1) The 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery was reassigned from II Field Force Vietnam Artillery to 23d Artillery Group effective 5 January 1971. Organic batteries of this organization are assigned the following tactical missions:

- (a) Battery A: General Support priority of fires to 5th ARVN Division Artillery.
- (b) Battery B: General Support reinforcing 5th ARVN Division Artillery.
- (c) Battery C: General Support reinforcing 5th ARVN Division Artillery.

(2) At the end of the reporting period the assigned personnel strength of the battalion was above the authorized however, shortages existed in certain MOS's.

(b) Battery B, 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery.

(1) 28 December 1970, battery departed Due Thien on closed FS₁ Buttons, Song Le, without incident.(2) 29 December 1970, battery departed Song Le via closed FS₁ Snuffy with 3 tubes. One tube was returned to Song Le for repair after slipping from a 10 ton tractor-trailer QTR use.(3) 27 March 1971, battery departed FS₁ Snuffy with 55 vehicles convoy in route to FS₁ Node. 35 vehicles closed Huoc Vinh in the remaining 20 vehicles closed Dong Kosi the first day.(4) 28 March 1971, 20 vehicles departed Dong Kosi and closed Huoc Vinh. Battery departed Huoc Vinh and closed FS₁ Node. One vehicle was abandoned on the trip when it broke down and could not be recovered.(5) 6 April 1971, 2 tubes 175mm departed FS₁ Node and closed FS₁ Haymaker. - (1) 22 November 1970, battery closed FSB Simmons and became CICCN to this battalion.
- (2) 26 December 1970, battery departed FSB Simmons in route to French Fort. Battery cleared Da Tieng and terminated CICCN to this battalion.
- (e) Battery B, 2nd Battalion, 12th Artillery (CICCN). Battery departed Da Dap 5 December 1970 terminating CICCN to this battalion.
- (f) Battery C, 2nd Battalion, 12th Artillery (CICCN).
- (1) 5 December 1970, battery departed FSB Snuffy and closed Lu Dap becoming CICCN to this battalion.
- (2) 2 February 1971, battery departed FSB Lu Dap terminating CICCN to this battalion.

The AWCC/CFSCC is under supervision of the battalion liaison Officer at Song Lo. This Combined AWCC/CFSCC is presently being operated in addition to the one being operated by the battalion at an Loc.

NOTE: This battalion had no firing accidents/incidents during the reporting period. CICCM units, battery A, 2nd Battalion, 35th Artillery, and battery C, 2nd Battalion, 12th Artillery, each had one firing incident. The incidents were fully investigated and the investigations failed to produce any evidence that the batteries were directly responsible.

C. Training.

(1) A continuous cross-training program of personnel is necessary due to the constant turnover of personnel and certain shortages in critical MOS's. Significant skills developed in the program are fire direction personnel, gun section chiefs, ATC operators, and cooks.

(2) In-country schools are being utilized to upgrade assigned personnel through attendance at Fire Direction Officers school and a school for fire direction personnel. These courses are conducted by 23d Artillery Group as required.

(3) New arrivals in the unit continue to receive in-country replacement training within one week of arrival. At the beginning of the reporting period, this training was conducted by the 1st Cavalry Division (A/I) Academy at Bien Hoa. However, with troop withdrawals, in-country training is now being controlled and supervised by 23d Artillery Group to provide a firm basis for rapid adaptability of the individual to a combat environment.

D. Intelligence.

(1) During the reporting period, aerial observers of this battalion flew 126 WA missions, consisting of 294 hours, which resulted in three significant sightings. Aerial observers conducted 43 registrations during this period.

(2) Target Surveillance.

(a) 3 January 1971, Btry C expended 22 rounds 175mm on grid XU571961 resulting in two 20x20 bunkers, two 3x5 bunkers, and three 5x8 bunkers destroyed. Two 10x15 hootches were uncovered and partially destroyed.

(b) 7 January 1971, Btry C fired 11 rounds 175mm on grid XU764252 resulting in two 10x10 bunkers destroyed and one secondary explosion. Btry C, 2-12th Arty (CICOK) expended 20 rounds 155mm XU899229 and partially destroyed an anti-aircraft position.

(c) 14 January 1971, Btry C fired 24 rounds 175mm on YU320376 killing one enemy soldier, destroying one bunker, and uncovering one spider hole.

(d) 22 January 1971, Btry C 2-12th Arty (CICOK) expended 50 rounds 155mm on grid XU920231 resulting in four bunkers destroyed, three anti-aircraft positions destroyed, seven 3x5 fighting positions destroyed, four 5x5 bunkers destroyed, and one 5x8 bunker damaged.

(e) 27 January 1971, Btry C fired 38 rounds 175mm on XT599920 resulting in 2 fighting positions destroyed, one 2x3 fighting positions partially destroyed and two 10x15 bunkers destroyed.

(f) 29 January 1971, Btry C expended 45 rounds 175mm on grid XT613096. Surveillance revealed two 20x20 bunkers destroyed and one kitchen site destroyed.

(g) 31 January 1971, Btry C expended 19 rounds 8" on grid YU210405 resulting in two spider holes destroyed, one rice sifter destroyed, ten meters of trench line destroyed, one 10x10 bunker destroyed. 30 rounds 8" were expended on grid YU207407 resulting in one 3x5 bunker and one 5x8 hooch damaged.

(h) 6 February 1971, Btry C expended 17 rounds 175mm on XU74524 resulting in one 50x50 bunker, eight 6x10 bunkers destroyed and 50 meters of trench line uncovered.

(i) 7 February 1971, Btry C fired 49 rounds 8" AU666254 killing 2 WA and destroying 20 bunkers.

(j) 9 February 1971, Btry C expended 30 rounds 8" on grid XU637203 resulting in 5 enemy killed by artillery.

(k) 17 February 1971, Btry A conducted a fire mission on a reported enemy unit located XU940420. Surveillance credited the battery with 6 enemy killed by artillery and approximately 15 enemy wounded by artillery.

(l) 15 March 1971, Btry C fired on a reported enemy company located vicinity XU678238. Results: 5 enemy killed by artillery, numerous blood trails, and 2 anti-tank mines captured.

(m) 16 March 1971, Btry A fired on grid XU960422. Surveillance revealed one enemy killed by artillery. In a second fire mission on grid XU972245, in support of an ARVN patrol, Btry C was credited with seven enemy killed by artillery.

(n) 11 April 1971, Btry D expended 28 rounds 8" on a bunker complex XU693234. One bunker was destroyed and 2 fighting positions uncovered.

(o) 12 April 1971, Btry A expended 10 rounds 8" on grid YU62210 in support of an ARVN operation. Surveillance revealed 30 enemy killed by artillery. In addition, the following enemy material was captured: 51 anti-tank mines, 26 rounds 120mm mortar, 30 grenades, 150 I-40 charges, 40 I-41 charges, 20x20mm mortar rounds rigged as mines, 1x60mm mortar base plate, 5000 meters communications wire, 1x12mm mortar sight, 2x60mm mortar rounds, 2 radios, 5 I-41 rounds, 8 I-40 rounds. 40 hatchets were also discovered in this same general area.

(p) Survey operations during the reporting period established 5 battery centers, 17 orienting stations, 15 orienting lines, and 2 declination stations. In addition, one counter-mortar radar position was surveyed at Trung Lap. The battalion survey section also conducted a 2 week survey course at Lai Sun. This training was given to survey personnel of 5th ARVN Division Artillery.

E. Logistics and maintenance. The battalion engaged in normal supply and maintenance activities during the reporting period. Supplies were air delivered to Bu Dap and Lu Gia Map (FMS Snuffy). During the latter part of the reporting period, class III and IV supplies were delivered to Lu Gia Map and Lu Dap by vehicle convoy. Class I was delivered by air to these locations on a daily basis. Units at Loc Ninh (PSL Wade) during the reporting period were resupplied overland using both organic and non-organic vehicles. Class I is now delivered to PSL Wade daily while other types of supplies are delivered as needed. Towards the end of the reporting period, battery is moved from Lu Gia Map to PSL Wade and normal resupply was continuing. Numerous maintenance problems were encountered on the H107 and H110 tracks with hydraulic systems and cracked fuel cells being the primary problems. Difficulty was encountered with the Direct Support Maintenance Company in that they did not have sufficient personnel to provide contact teams for maintenance at Fire Support Posts. Monthly ammunition allocations for items such as Red Star and White Star cluster hand flares were not issued in sufficient quantity to meet operational requirements at Fire Support Posts. More realistic

cutback should be taken by higher headquarters in determining monthly allocations for ASK items.

F. Others.

(1) Medical. The health of the command continues to be good. Emphasis was placed on sanitation and the prevention of malaria through periodic classes conducted by the Battalion Surgeon. Classes were also presented on venereal disease and drug orientation. The drug problem continues to increase. With the amnesty program being conducted, this battalion has developed its own Half-way House for members of the organization. Emphasis is placed on complete withdrawal and rehabilitation. With the reduction of troops, the MEDCAP program has been curtailed. At present, the Battalion Surgeon is conducting periodic visits to the Province Hospital at Phu Cuong. In addition, the battalion aid station has an open door policy to all Vietnamese and has treated over 1400 civilians.

(2) Communications. During the reporting period it was determined that the battalion cutback retransmission station on Nui La Ha was difficult to maintain and support when only local resources are available. Extensive logistical support was found necessary for resupplying water, fuel, rations, and equipment. At this time, we are establishing a retransmission station at an alternate site, Nui La Den, with inconclusive results. Another problem during this period resulted when the direct land line between the radio at An Loc and Song Be and Paris Control, Tan Son Nhut, was removed. This has created a problem in passing artillery data with the Air Force. Presently the ANCC's must call through the Vietnamese switchboard at Song Be and An Loc to the Vietnamese switchboard at Lai Khe, then must ask for the US switchboard; upon obtaining the US switchboard it is still difficult to reach Tan Son Nhut because of the poor telephone communications that exist in Vietnam. No acceptable substitute has been found and this results in an unacceptable communications problem which must be resolved. This battalion has assumed the responsibility for the Castle sector of the Phu Lai West perimeter. Due to a lack of proper materials it was necessary to install WD-1/TT for wire communications on the bunker line. This was found to be unacceptable because of continuing maintenance problems. Twenty-six pair cable has been substituted as it became available and the efficiency of wire communications has been greatly increased.

2. (C) Lessons Learned: Commander's Observations, Evaluations, and Recommendations:

A. Personnel: None.

B. Operations: Fire Support Base Perimeter Defense.

(1) Observation. With the reduction of American Forces in South Vietnam it is becoming more difficult to provide the proper security for artillery batteries occupying Fire Support bases.

(2) Evaluation. It is becoming extremely difficult to provide the maximum desirable security at night for artillery Fire Support bases. With the phasing out of American ground units in this area of operation, Fire base security is dependent entirely on the artillermen occupying the base; and on occasion, some help from ARVN or RFIF troops. With present operational requirements, it is not always possible to have such ARVN support; therefore, it is becoming more and more hazardous for the unit(s) occupying the position.

(3) Recommendations. That MTCE change be approved authorizing each battery one (1) 81mm mortar and a minimum of two Starlight scopes for utilization in defense of the fire base. The 81mm mortar would be used to fire illumination and assist in close in fire support using high explosive shells. The Starlight scopes, mounted on M-14 sniper rifles, would be effective at night in detecting movement outside the perimeter and in bringing more effective fire on the enemy. The Starlight scopes would be of great help in detecting sniper type attacks and in reducing the effects of such enemy operations.

C. Training: None.

D. Intelligence: None.

E. Logistics and Maintenance: Replacing Tube assembly, Metal on M-17 & M110 Artillery Weapons.

(1) Observation. During the reporting period it has been noted that the Tube assembly, Metal (OHC Lanes) (PSN: 252-845-023) on the M-17/M110 artillery pieces have not been holding up and has caused an increase in the deadline rate for artillery.

(2) Evaluation. The Tube assembly, Metal presently being utilized on the M107/M110 artillery weapons have proven to be unsatisfactory in that they do not meet the requirements for durability or serviceability. In overcoming this repair problem, the battalion maintenance section has been using material obtained from the Army Aviation elements here in Vietnam. Through the use of this material our deadline rate has been reduced.

(3) Recommendation. That the present Tube Assembly, Metal now being utilized be replaced by the steel flexible hose and fittings listed below:



D. Intelligence.

(1) During the reporting period, aerial observers of this battalion flew 126 VA missions, consisting of 294 hours, which resulted in three significant sightings. Aerial observers conducted 43 registrations during this period.

(2) Target Surveillance.

(a) 3 January 1971, Btry C expended 22 rounds 175mm on grid XU571961 resulting in two 20x20 bunkers, two 3x5 bunkers, and three 5x8 bunkers destroyed. Two 10x15 hootches were uncovered and partially destroyed.

(b) 7 January 1971, Battery C fired 11 rounds 175mm on grid XU764252 resulting in two 10x10 bunkers destroyed and one secondary explosion. Btry C, 2-12th Arty (OFCON) expended 20 rounds 155mm XU899229 and partially destroyed an anti-aircraft position.

(c) 14 January 1971, Btry C fired 24 rounds 175mm on YU320376 killing one enemy soldier, destroying one bunker, and uncovering one spider hole.

(d) 22 January 1971, Btry C 2-12th Arty (OFCON) expended 50 rounds 155mm on grid XU926230 resulting in four bunkers destroyed, three anti-aircraft positions destroyed, seven 3x5 fighting positions destroyed, four 5x5 bunkers destroyed, and one 5x8 bunker damaged.

(e) 27 January 1971, Btry C fired 38 rounds 175mm on XT59992, resulting in 2 fighting positions destroyed, one 2x3 fighting positions partially destroyed and two 10x15 bunkers destroyed.

(f) 29 January 1971, Btry C expended 45 rounds 175mm on grid XT613898. Surveillance revealed two 20x20 bunkers destroyed and one kitchen site destroyed.

(g) 31 January 1971, Btry C expended 19 rounds 8" on grid YU210405 resulting in two spider holes destroyed, one rice sifter destroyed, ten meters of trench line destroyed, one 10x10 bunker destroyed. 30 rounds 8" were expended on grid YU207407 resulting in one 3x5 bunker and one 5x8 hooch damaged.

(k) 17 February 1971, Btry A conducted a fire mission on a reported enemy unit located XU940420. Surveillance credited the battery with 6 enemy killed by artillery and approximately 15 enemy wounded by artillery.

(l) 15 March 1971, Btry C fired on a reported enemy company located vicinity XU678238. Results: 5 enemy killed by artillery, numerous blood trails, and 2 anti-tank mines captured.

(m) 16 March 1971, Btry A fired on grid XU960422. Surveillance revealed one enemy killed by artillery. In a second fire mission on grid XU672245, in support of an ARVN patrol, Btry C was credited with seven enemy killed by artillery.

* (n) 11 April 1971, Btry B expended 28 rounds 8" on a bunker complex XU693234. One bunker was destroyed and 2 fighting positions uncovered.

(o) 12 April 1971, Btry A expended 10 rounds 8" on grid YU622118 in support of an ARVN operation. Surveillance revealed 30 enemy killed by artillery. In addition, the following enemy material was captured: 51 anti-tank mines, 26 rounds 120mm mortar, 36 grenades, 150 B-40 charges, 40 B-41 charges, 20x82mm mortar rounds rigged as mines, 1x60mm mortar base plate, 5000 meters communications wire, 1x120mm mortar sight, 20x60mm mortar rounds, 2 radars, 5 B-41 rounds, 80 B-40 rounds. 40 hootches were also discovered in this same general area.

(p) Survey operations during the reporting period established 5 battery centers, 17 orienting stations, 15 orienting lines, and 2 declination stations. In addition, one countermortar radar position was surveyed at Trung Lap. The battalion survey section also conducted a 2 week survey course at Lai Son. This training was given to survey personnel of 5th ARVN Division Artillery.

E. Logistics and maintenance. The battalion engaged in normal supply and maintenance activities during the reporting period. Supplies were air delivered to Bu Dap and Bu Gia Map (FSB Smiffy). During the latter part of the reporting period, class III and IV supplies were delivered to Bu Gia Map and Bu Dap by vehicle convoy. Class I was delivered by air to these locations on a daily basis. Units at Loc Ninh (FSB Wade) during the reporting period were resupplied overland using both organic and non-organic vehicles. Class I is now delivered to FSB Wade daily while other types of supplies are delivered as needed. Towards the end of the reporting period, Battery B moved from Bu Gia Map to FSB Wade and normal resupply was continued. Numerous maintenance problems were encountered on the M107 and M110 tracks with hydraulic systems and cracked fuel cells being the primary problems. Difficulty was encountered with the Direct Support Maintenance Company in that they did not have sufficient personnel to provide contact teams for maintenance at Fire Support Bases. Monthly ammunition allocations for items such as Red Star and White Star cluster hand flares were not issued in sufficient quantity to meet operational requirements at Fire Support Bases. outlook should be taken by higher headquarters in determining monthly allocations for ASK items.

F. Others.

(1) Medical. The health of the command continues to be good. Emphasis was placed on sanitation and the prevention of malaria through periodic classes conducted by the Battalion Surgeon. Classes were also presented on venereal disease and drug orientation. The drug problem continues to increase. With the amnesty program being conducted, this battalion has developed its own Half-way House for members of the organization. Emphasis is placed on complete withdrawal and rehabilitation. With the reduction of troops, the MEDCAF program has been curtailed. At present, the Battalion Surgeon is conducting periodic visits to the Province Hospital at Phu Cucng. In addition, the battalion aid station has an open door policy to all Vietnamese and has treated over 1400 civilians.

(2) Communications. During the reporting period it was determined that the battalion automatic retransmission station on Nui La Ha was difficult to maintain and support when only local resources are available. Extensive logistical support was found necessary for resupplying water, ICL, rations, and equipment. At this time, we are establishing a retransmission station at an alternate site, Nui Lin Den, with inconclusive results. Another problem during this period resulted when the direct land line between the ANCC at An Loc and SONG BE and Lai Khe Control, Tan Son Nhut, was removed. This has created a problem in posting artillery data with the Air Force. Presently the ANCC's must call through the Vietnamese switchboard at SONG BE and AN LOC to the Vietnamese switchboard at Lai Khe, then must ask for the US switchboard; upon obtaining the US switchboard it is still difficult to reach Tan Son Nhut because of the poor telephone communications that exist in Vietnam. No acceptable substitute has been found and this results in an unacceptable communications problem which must be resolved. This battalion has assumed the responsibility for the Castle sector of the Phu Loi Post perimeter. Due to a lack of proper materials it was necessary to install WD-1/TT for wire communications on the bunker line. This was found to be unacceptable because of continuing maintenance problems. Twenty-six pair cable has been substituted as it became available and the efficiency of wire communications has been greatly increased.

2. (C) Lessons Learned: Commander's Observations, Evaluations, and Recommendations:


A. Personnel: None.

B. Operations: Fire Support Base Perimeter Defense.

(1) Observation. With the reduction of American Forces in South Vietnam it is becoming more difficult to provide the proper security for artillery batteries occupying Fire Support bases.

(2) Evaluation. It is becoming extremely difficult to provide the maximum desirable security at night for artillery Fire Support Bases. With the phasing out of American ground units in this area of operation, Fire base security is dependent entirely on the artillermen occupying the base; and on occasion, some help from ARVN or RPF troops. With present operational requirements, it is not always possible to have such ARVN support; therefore, it is becoming more and more hazardous for the unit(s) occupying the position.

(3) Recommendations. That MTOE change be approved authorizing each battery one (1) 81mm mortar and a minimum of two Starlight scopes for utilization in defense of the fire base. The 81mm mortar would be used to fire illumination and assist in close in fire support using high explosive shells. The Starlight scopes, mounted on M-14 sniper rifles, would be effective at night in detecting movement outside the perimeter and in bringing more effective fire on the enemy. The Starlight scopes would be of great help in detecting sapper type attacks and in reducing the effects of such enemy operations.

D. Intelligence: None.

E. Logistics and Maintenance: Replacing Tube Assembly, Metal on M107 & M110 Artillery Weapons.

(1) Observation. During the reporting period it has been noted that the Tube Assembly, Metal (OHC Lines) (FSN: 2520-845-023) on the M107/M110 artillery pieces have not been holding up and has caused an increase in the deadline rate for artillery.


(2) Evaluation. The Tube Assembly, Metal presently being utilized on the M107/M110 artillery weapons have proven to be unsatisfactory in that they do not meet the requirements for durability or serviceability. In overcoming this repair problem, the battalion maintenance section has been using material obtained from the Army Aviation elements here in Vietnam. Through the use of this material our deadline rate has been reduced.

(3) Recommendation. That the present Tube Assembly, Metal now being utilized be replaced by the steel flexible hose and materials listed below:
