27TH ARTILLERY DVN

The 27th Artillery has provided the kind of accurate, responsive firepower that has historically provided support for the United States Army and her Allied units.

From its early beginnings at Camp McClellan, Alabama on August 2, 1918 to its present involvement in the Victnam Conflict, the 27th Artillery has remained a vital part of the American deterrent against aggression.

Although the 27th Field Artillery did not serve overseas during World War I, the activities of the 27th Field Artillery Battalion, (Armored), 1st Armored Division, established this battalion as one of the finest artillery units to have fought in WWII.

The 27th Artillery won military acclaim for its participation in the amphibious landings on North Africa, actions in Algiers and Tunisia, the Italian Campaign, and the invasion of Southern Europe. The fires of the 27th were of critical importance to American and Allied units in all of these campaigns.

From 1942 - 1945, the 27th Artillery spent more than 550 days in firing positions, fired a total of 380, 115 rounds of 105mm and 3,447 rounds of 75mm ammunition, and had more combat action than any other unit in the 1st Armored Division. The 27th Artillery compiled a long and enviable record of achievements during WII.

The post-war period was one of inactivation, activation, and redesignation for the 27th Artillery. On August 23, 1962, the 6th Hattalion, 27th Artillery was activated, added to the Army rolls, and was stationed at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas. Upon completion of three years of preparation, the battalion was deployed to the Republic of Vietnam in 1965 to support the fight against Communism in Southeast Asia.

Assigned to the 23d Artillery Group, II Field Force Artillery, the 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery faced the rugged task of engaging in fire support planning and then coordinating instantly available fire to maneuver units.

The battalion became the first US artillery element to fire into North Vietnam and its heavy artillery fires in 1967, 1968, and the early part of 1969 have destroyed NVA/VC base camps and has assisted in the defeat fo numerous enemy attacks. Artillery fire, American air superiority, and vigorous ground actions have made it increasingly difficult for the enemy to mount offensives or resupply his units. The 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery, a composite 8"/175mm howitzer battalion and its attached 155mm firing battery, Battery F, 16th Artillery, have been recommended for a Meritorious Unit Citation (MUC) for service performed during the period 1 Feb 69 to 31 Aug 69 for supporting numerous combat operations in RVN and an active participation in an aggressive Civic Action Program. In supporting US and ARVN forces during this seven month span, the battalion fired 87, 233 rounds of 155mm, 175mm, and 8" ammunition during 26, 355 missions without a single artillery incident. During this period, the battalion was credited with 192 NVA/VC confirmed killed by Artillery (KBA), 98 possible KBA, 614 bunkers destroyed and 88 secondary explosions. The batteries sustained 194 enemy rocket/mortar and ground attacks receiving an estimated total of 2,147 rounds causing 3 Killed In Action (KIA) and 45 Wounded In Action (WIA) among personnel of the battalion.

The battalion's Civic Action Program has provided support, assistance, and guidance for the Vietnamese people. Two Girl Scout and two Boy Scout troops were established, a Montagnard boarding school was built, and a vigorous MEDCAPS program was inagurated in conjunction with MACV advisors and province health teams.

AS of this writing, the 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery continues to serve valiantly in Vietnam. The active role of the battalion is evidenced by its total expenditures of 420,070 rounds of 155mm, 175mm, and 8" ammunition fired in counter rocket/mortar and support fires for the 1st Cavalry Division (AM), 1st Infantry Division, 101st Airborne Division, 5th ARVN Division, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, and close artillery support for Regular Force/Popular Force Special Forces Groups.

The 6th Battalion, 27th Artillery has indeed compiled a long and enviable record of achievement during the Vietnam Conflict. The "Cannon Kings" illuminated by past glory look forward to continued service in the cause of freedom.


Cannon King's Chief
