GI'S ENJOY XMAS GIFTS

The last of the packages was opened. The impoverished Montagnard orphans were smiling. The artillerymen and the maneuver forces they support were convinced that there still was someone who cared. These were but a few of the many reactions that accompanied the arrival of some 800 lbs. of gifts sent by children who were supporting "their men overseas" this Christmas.

The gifts were part of a project called "Operation Vietnam", started in 1966 with the students of E.W. Thurston Jr. High School, Westwood, Mass. sending presents to the 6/27th Arty, who distributed them to fighting units in the Quan Loi area.

The project was the brainchild of Eugene P. Tinory, a major in the Army Reserve, who teaches at the school. (See XMAS GIFTS, back page)


NEW GUYS & DEPARTING PERSONNEL

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

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


SCATHOW THEY WILL GET ALONG

In the past, the 6/27 has been a-warded a MUC for the period Jan 66-Oct 66. This citation can be worn as a rod ribbon and the new one can be worn as an oak leaf cluster while assigned.

This year's campaign was launched in mid-October, the same time moratorium day protests were held and culminated with the distribution of gifts on Christnas Day.

The 3d Brigade 1st Cavalry Division, the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, Special Forces units, and many orphans shared the numerous packages of clothes and toys.

In the past, more than 4,000 lbs. of packages have been mailed at Christmas time and year round contact has been established through an exchange of letters, photographs, and other items.

This year LTC Reed, commanding officer 6/27th Arty, will send the students a Montagnard crossbow in appreciation of their benevolent effort

The program received wide coverage by the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service (AFRTS) and many civilian newspapers.
